

BRAY

IS a pretty, well-built town, chiefly in the parish of its name, and partly in that of Old Connaught, barony of Rathdown, 10 miles s. by e. from Dublin; beautifully situated on the steep bank of the Bray, which stream abounds with trout; the chief part of the town is in the county of Wicklow, that portion called LITTLE BRAY being in the county of Dublin. Bray-head, a stupendous rocky mountain, rears its front contiguous to the town, and presents a most majestic appearance. The magnificent scenery around, and the purity of the air and water, attract great numbers of visitants to this popular bathing place, for whose accommodation there are numerous lodging and boarding houses, and Quin's noble hotel, one of the most extensive and best conducted establishments of the kind in Ireland. The environs of Bray are studded with the mansions and demesnes of the nobility and gentry, and when the

railway reaches Bray, from Kingstown, its boundaries will enlarge, its residents multiply, and its animation and prosperity augment. The new court-house is very ornamental to the town; quarter sessions are held therein, and petty sessions the second Saturday in the month.

The parish church is situated on a steep and lofty eminence, overhanging the river, and there is a handsome church, newly erected, on the north side of the town, with a pinnacled tower, in the Norman style; there is also a Roman Catholic chapel, and a place of worship for the Methodists. A fever hospital, two dispensaries, the like number of national schools, and a loan fund, are the other public institutions. Fairs, March 1st, May 1st, July 1st, August 15th, September 20th, and December 14th. The return of the population, in 1841, was 3,169.

CONVEYANCE BY RAILWAY.
The DUBLIN and KINGSTOWN Railway is six miles distant, to which there is an omnibus three times a day, from Quin's Hotel.
OMNIBUSES, &c.

CALLAN,

A MARKET and post town, barony & parish, county of Kilkenny, is 83 miles s. by w. from Dublin, 21 s.e. by n. from Clonmel, 12 s.w. from Gowran, and 10 s.w. from Kilkenny; situated on the banks of the King's river, on the main road from the last named town to Cashel and Clonmel. Prior to the union of Ireland with Great Britain, Callan sent two members to the Irish parliament, and it seems to have been a place of great antiquity, for there are the remains of three castles still standing; and the friary here, which is in a flourishing state, was founded as early as the beginning of the fourteenth century. The making of boots and shoes is very extensively carried on in this town.

The parish church, a small but neat building, appears to have formed part of the abbey church of Augustinian Eremites, founded in the fifteenth century, and this, with the abbey, were of great magnitude, as evidenced by the outer walls and a portion of the nave, which are yet standing. There are two Roman Catholic chapels, one belonging to the friars, who perform the service, and the parish chapel; the latter very handsome, with a modern steeple, and both spacious structures. The other public establishments are a dispensary; a court-house, of modern erection and handsome; an union poor-house, a free school, and a bridewell. The markets are held on Tuesday and Saturday, and the fairs June 12th, July 10th, August 21st, October 16th, November 4th, and December 14th. Population 3,111.

To DUBLIN, the Royal Mail (from Cork), every evening, at half-past seven; goes through Kilkenny, Carlow and Naas.

CARLINGFORD,

A MARKET town, sea-port and parish, in the barony of Dundalk, county of Louth, 64 miles n. from Dublin, 15 n.e. from Dundalk, and 11 s.e. from Newry, is situated near the bay of its name, entering from the Irish Sea. The bay has a deep and capacious harbour, where the largest vessels may anchor in safety, but the entrance is obstructed by dangerous rocks, so that it is fishing boats chiefly that frequent the haven. Large quantities of fine flavoured oysters are taken here, and

sent to Dublin and the English markets. The government of the town is vested in a sovereign. It was formerly a parliamentary borough, and although it combines beauty of site, and eligibility of situation for business, yet it is by no means prosperous, and its internal appearance is anything but prepossessing. The parish church is an ancient structure, and the Catholic chapel, which is situated near to it, is a plain and convenient one. A new church is projected to be
