CASTLE-BELLINGHAM, DUNLEER,

The heautiful seat of Sir Allam Bellingham, Bart. adjoins the village, and is a charming feature in the surrounding landscape. With the exception of a considerable brewery, it is a place of very little trade. The places of worship are the church, an ancient building of stone; and the Roman Catholic chapel, situated a short way from the town, dedicated to the Virgin Mary.
