## DURROW.

A SMALL town and parish, 69 miles s.w. from Dublin, 17 n.w. from Kilkenny, and 14 s.e. from Monrath; is situated on the banks of the Erkua, or *Erkin*, which stream skirts the northern boundary of the town, and propels the machinery of a considerable corn mill. This town, with its estates, was formerly part of Queen's county (by which it is, in fact, surrounded), but, on coming into the possession of the Butler family, who were perpetually harassed by the adherents of the Fitzpatricks, the Earl of Ormonde procured an act of parliament to make Durrow, with its appurtenances, part of the county of Kilkenny. The town, which is lively, clean and neat, consists chiefly of one long street, with a large square in the centre, formed partly of several well-built houses. Petty sessions are held here every second Wednesday.

The Catholic chapel is a remarkably fine structure, very spacious, and the interior is magnificently fitted up. There is a dispensary in the parish. Fairs January 2nd, March 4th, May 22nd, August 21st, and November 20th. Population, in 1841, 1,318.

## EDENDERRY

A NEAT market town, in the parish of Monasteroris, barony of Coalestown, King's county, 37 miles w. from Dublin, 13 s. by n. from Philipstown, 8 s. by w. from Clonard, and 7½ n. from Rathangan; situated near the river Boyne, at the north-eastern extremity of the county, and on a branch of the Grand Canal, which has been brought to the town. This useful work was accomplished by the liberality of the late Marquess of Downshire, the proprietor of the place, and its tasteful improver; he likewise caused most of the unsightly thatched cabins to give place to neat stone-built and slate-roofed houses. A new road has also been formed to Rathangan, which shortens the distance to that town three miles. The Society of Friends are numerous here, and assist in imparting to the town much of their characteristic neatness. The woollen trade, which formerly flourished in this place, has all but disappeared, and corn may now be considered the staple article of commerce. A seshal court is held in Edenderry every week, on Thursdays and Saturdays, for adjudicating claims for small debts.
