radiating plan, surmounted with a turret and clock—the
latter having four faces. The cost of its erection
amounted to £19,500, and its internal regulations, which
are upon the most approved principles, are admirably
administered by its present governor, Archibald Wilson,
Esq. The district lunatic asylum is an elegant stone
erection, situated a short distance from the town, in a
picturesque and healthful spot. It cost £24,172, and
will accommodate one hundred and sixty patients, who
are treated upon the humane system of non-restraint,
and every comfort and amusement provided that the
inmates are susceptible of enjoying: the present able
manager is William Abbott, Esq. The county infir-
mary, which has a dispensary attached, was erected in
1808, near the two institutions above noticed. The
professional department of this institution is skillfully
superintended by Dr. Jacob. The court-house, situated

in the centre of the main street, is a very old building.
A newspaper, the 'Leinster Express,' is published
here every Saturday morning, and is conducted with
considerable talent.

The places of worship are the parish church, a rather
handsome structure with a steeple; a spacious Roman
Catholic chapel, and one each for Wesleyan Methodists
and Calvinists. There is also a convent of the presen-
tation, wherein two hundred children are gratuitously
instructed, and an extensive school upon the national
system—to the latter a private classical academy is
attached. Within three miles of the town, on the road to
Strabally, is the singular and stupendous rock, called
'Dun Mall,' said to have been a fortification, in ages
past, of great strength. The market is held on Thurs-
day; and the fairs January 1st, February 24th, May
12th, July 5th, and Sept. 4th. Population, in 1841, 3,633.

MARYBOROUGH.

THE capital of Queen's county is an incorporated
market and post town and parish, in the barony of
East Maryborough, 51 miles w. from Dublin and 14 v.
from Athy, situated on a river tributary to the Barrow,
and on the main road between Limerick and the
western counties. It is an ancient town, and derived
its importance and its name from the erection of the
territory of Leix, in the reign of Philip and Mary, into
Queen's county, of which it was constituted the county
and assize town, and was called Maryborough in honour
of the queen. The town consists principally of one
long street, in which the chief business of the town is
carried on, with other smaller ones leading from it,
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and a spacious market square, with a turret and clock.
This is an improving place both in its aspect and trade;
and albeit the cotton manufacture has fallen to decay,
there are other branches of importance, among which
the corn mills are of considerable magnitude. The
principal hotels are Fallon's and Power's—the former
a family, commercial and posting establishment of great
and long-standing respectability.

The public buildings and institutions, exclusive of
those for divine worship, are the district lunatic asylum,
the gaol, the county infirmary, the court-house,
barracks and the public schools. The gaol, which was
completed in 1830, is a fine structure, built on the
