

MULLINGAR.

THE capital of Westmeath, is a market town and parish, partly in the Barony of Fartullagh, but chiefly in that of Moyashee and Magheradernon, 39 miles W. from Dublin, encircled by the Royal Canal, by which a navigable intercourse is maintained with the metropolis; the River Brosna also flows near it; and in all probability it will be for some time the terminus of the Dublin and Galway railway. This town is of considerable antiquity, and was the site of religious establishments at an early period. In 1227, Ralph de Petyt, Bishop of Meath, founded a priory for Augustinian canons, which was dedicated to the blessed Virgin, and long designated the "House of God of Mullingar." The town, which is pretty well built, consists of one principal street (of which its name is descriptive), with some smaller ones branching from it. There is a branch of the London and Dublin bank in the town. In the vicinity of Mullingar are several beautiful lakes, each several miles in circumference, all well stored with fish, particularly trout, and during the season are the resort of many lovers of the rod and hook. One of the principal public buildings is the court-house, a beautiful structure, situated near the gaol; here are held the assizes for the county, quarter sessions in January, April, June, and October, and petty sessions every Saturday. The county gaol, at the bottom of Gaol-street, has lately received several additions, and it has now accommodation for nearly two hundred

prisoners. An extensive range of barracks, convenient for a thousand men and officers, a county infirmary, police-barrack, market-house, and a union workhouse, are the other public buildings. The workhouse, a convenient structure, was erected in 1841, at a cost of £9,000, and can administer to the comfort and accommodation of eight hundred poor.

The parish church is a spacious modern cruciform structure, with a tower, surmounted by a spire, erected in 1813, on the site of a former ancient church, at a cost of £3,554. The Roman Catholic chapel, dedicated to the blessed Virgin, is a beautiful edifice, lately erected, at a cost of about £8,000. The interior is spacious and contains a fine toned organ, and at the altar a finely executed painting of the Saviour taken down from the cross. A convent of presentation nuns here has in connexion with it an excellent school, in which five hundred poor girls are taught by the exemplary members. The Presbyterians and Wesleyan Methodists have their respective places of worship, and there are diocesan, national, and Protestant schools. The land round Mullingar is fertile, well cultivated, and well watered. The markets and fairs are well attended—the former are held on Thursday; the fairs April 6th, July 4th, August 29th, and November 11th and 12th. The parish of Mullingar contained, by the returns made in 1841, 9,103 inhabitants, and the town 4,569 of that number.
