NEW ROSS, WITH THE VILLAGE OF ROSSBERCON.

NEW ROSS is a market town and parish, a borough both corporate and parliamentary, and a river port, partly in the barony of Shelburn, but chiefly in that of Bantry, county of Wexford, 85 miles s. from Dublin, 15 s. from Waterford, 24 e. of Wexford, and the like distance s.e. from Kilkenny; elegantly situated on the eastern bank of the Barrow, about a mile from the junction of that river with the Nore. The Barrow is crossed by a long and wide wooden bridge, with a port-cullis for the passage of vessels, the river being deep enough to admit those of a thousand tons burthen to lie alongside the quay. Connected as this town is with the British channel by a safe and capacious river, and by the Nore and Barrow, with five or six of the most populous and productive counties in the kingdom, together with its proximity to the sea, it cannot but be lamented that it does not enjoy that prosperity which its local advantages would seem likely to bestow. The government of the town is vested in commissioners, elected under the town act of 9th George IV., who hold their meetings monthly; and under this new regulation the town has been considerably improved, and gas introduced. The tholse is surmounted by a turret, with a clock; and in South-street is a very commodious court-house, recently erected, adjoining the New Bridge-well, in which quarter and petty sessions are held—the latter every fortnight. The present representative of the borough is the Hon. Captain Henry Gore, M.P.

The parish church is a plain building, with a square tower, and there is a small but handsome chapel of ease in South-street, lately erected. There are two handsome Roman Catholic chapels, one of which has a tower and spire; a chapel each for Presbyterians and Independents; two for Wesleyan Methodists; a Friends' meeting-house; and a convent each of the Augustine and Carmelite orders—these are the other edifices

for divine worship. The last-named convent is delightfully situated: there are chapels attached to both, and in a school belonging to the Carmelite establishment upwards of three hundred children are gratuitously educated by the exemplary nuns. There is an endowed school, founded by Sir John Ivory in the twelfth year of the reign of Queen Anne, for the education of four poor protestant boys in Greek and Latin, and there are two other free schools, one of which is under the controul of the Board of Education; also one for infants. New Ross possesses a fever hospital, with a dispensary attached; a lying-in hospital, and Trinity hospital: the last-named founded by royal charter, in the reign of Elizabeth, for widows having been householders, who, besides the apartments, have an annual allowance of £14. The poor-house is a handsome and spacious building, erected on a lofty and healthy site. The market days are Wednesday and Saturday. Fairs April 23rd, May 3rd, June 2nd, August 6th, and October 5th. The population of the borough (including Rossbercon), according to the parliamentary returns for 1841, was 7,543.

ROSSBERCON, or *Rossbercon*, is a village and parish, in the barony of Ida, county of Kilkenny, situate on the western side of the river Barrow, opposite to and included within the limits of New Ross borough, of which indeed it may be deemed a suburb. A monastery to the Virgin Mary was founded here, about 1260. The ruins are extensive and picturesque, comprising the lofty towers of the church, resting on four pointed arches, and the south wall of an aisle, containing several arches and windows. Besides the parish church, a Roman Catholic chapel and two free schools are in the village. Petty sessions are held once a fortnight. The parish contains 1,538 inhabitants, and the village 110 of that number.
