

mentioned. Previously the estates of Portarlinton were granted by Queen Elizabeth to Lord Clonmoline. His successor, for his conduct in the rebellion of 1641, was attainted of treason, and forfeited all his lands, which were bestowed on Sir Henry Bennett, one of the ministers of Charles II, who was created Lord Arlingford. The estates became forfeited again in the rebellion of 1688, and in 1696 King William granted the lands to his Dutch followers, and his favourite Lord Galway, who made leases of the town and estates for ever to a number of French Protestants, who came over with him. He also erected two churches, one for the French and the other for the English settlers; and these are still continued, and endowed with lands. He assigned funds for an English and a French school, which were the means of establishing in Portarlinton those eminent seminaries, which have produced some of the most shining characters in the kingdom—among these the Duke of Wellington and his brother, the Marquess of Wellesley, who received their early education here. The civil and municipal affairs of the borough are transacted under the jurisdiction of the magistrates, who hold their meetings in the court-house every Wednesday; and manorial courts meet and one of record are likewise held here. The borough returns one member to the imperial parliament: the

gentleman at present sitting for it is the Right Hon. Colonel G. L. Dames. The English church of St. Michael is a neat edifice, with a lofty spire. The French church, or St. Paul's, is a simple, unassuming structure: service was formerly performed in the French language, but for many years the English has been adopted. The livings of each of these churches are independent chapels, in the gift of the Bishop of Kildare. The Roman Catholic chapel, situated at the west end of the town, is a modern building, near to which is a convent of Presentation nuns. There are also chapels for Wesleyan Methodists and Plymouth brethren. A munificent charity, amounting to £105, per annum, was bequeathed by a Miss Cary, an inhabitant of this town, £50, of which is divided among poor protestants of good character; £10, is applied to apprentice one protestant boy to a trade, and £10, to the male and £5, to the female parochial schools. These schools are also aided by Lord Galway's endowment. A savings' bank, a loan fund, and a dispensary are the other public institutions. The market days are Wednesday (by charter) and Saturday (by custom). Fairs January 6th, March 2nd, Easter Monday, May 22nd, July 4th, September 1st, October 12th, and November 23rd. The population of the town, in 1831, was 3,106.

RATHANGAN.

It is a small market town and parish, the latter partly in the barony of East Ophaly, but chiefly in that of West Ophaly, county of Kildare, 33 miles S.W. from Dublin, 10 S.E. from Edenderry, and 6 N. by W. from Kildare; situated on the eastern bank of the Grand Canal, and near the verge of the counties of Kildare and King's. The town, which is the property of the Duke of Leinster, is tolerably well built, and is the residence, with the neighbourhood, of several respectable families. The place, however, enjoys but little trade, notwithstanding its eligibility of situation for that purpose. The magistrates, in whom the government of the town is vested, hold a petty session every Monday.
